In our Second Reading we hear from the *Book of Revelation* (Greek: *Apocalypse*). The last book of the Bible, it tells of the mysterious vision of John (often understood to be St John the evangelist).

Much of his vision is symbolic, but part of what is symbolised is certainly the end of the world and what we call 'the last things'. It can seem a bit inaccessible, with its angels and strange animals and trumpets and battles. But we cannot help be moved by the wonderful vision of the things to come in its final chapters, concluding the entire Bible:

I, John, saw a new heaven and a new earth...I saw the holy City, and the new Jerusalem, coming down from God out of heaven, as beautiful as a bride all dressed for her husband. Here God lives among his people...He will wipe away all tears from their eyes; there will be no more death, and no more mourning or sadness. The world of the past has gone. (*Rev 21:1-4*)

This future destiny of everlasting happiness, with no more death or sadness, has given a great motivation for the whole Christian life. Yet in recent times that motivation has sometimes been blunted. People assure themselves, regardless of the warnings of Jesus, the Bible and the Church, that heaven is all but guaranteed for most people; and when something is guaranteed no matter what we do, it tends to drop out of consideration.

Others fear they might not even enjoy heaven that much – maybe conceiving of it merely as some 'luxury resort in

the sky' – not understanding that the soul in heaven will be flooded forever with the infinite perfection, goodness, joy, knowledge and love of God, with which it is impossible to ever tire or be dissatisfied.

Others, not realising that there are different degrees of heavenly happiness, think they might as well just do the minimum, and still get the same eternal reward as if they had lived lives of great holiness. In fact, from the teachings of Jesus, the Bible and the Church we learn that the more we have allowed God to expand our souls with his love and grace in this life, the more he can fill our souls in eternity. We open ourselves to this through the Sacraments (especially the Eucharist) and prayer, and this flows into lives of faith-filled love, obedience and service.

Others, finally, unaware of the strength of all the rational evidence for the truth of Christian faith, are tempted to doubt the reality of heaven and hell in the first place. But the more we inform ourselves, the more we overcome these attitudes that could lead us astray.

And so we are led to persevere on our pilgrim journey, until we reach the final goal:

The throne of God and of the Lamb will be in the city, and his servants will worship him, they will see his face, and his name will be on their foreheads. And night shall be no more; they need no light of lamp or sun, for the Lord God will be their light, and they shall reign for ever and ever. (*Rev 22:3-5*)

SAINT OF THE WEEK

18th May: Saint John I, Pope, Martyr

A native of Siena in Tuscany, Italy, St John I was elected pope in 523. In this time after the fall of the Western Roman Empire in 476, Italy was ruled by the Ostrogoths, who adhered to the Arian heresy, which denied Christ's full divinity.

In 519, the continuing Eastern Roman (Byzantine) Empire had returned to religious union with Rome after a 35-year schism, with the accession of the strongly Catholic emperor Justin I bringing renewed recognition of papal authority by the Byzantine emperors and bishops. Justin also took measures against the Arians in Byzantine lands; so Theodoric, King of the Ostrogoths, forced Pope John to travel to Constantinople [*now Istanbul*], the imperial capital, to gain leniency for the Arians.

John was welcomed in Constantinople by throngs of the faithful; Emperor Justin prostrated himself and had himself re-crowned by the Pope. Although John's embassy was relatively successful, upon his return to Italy Theodoric imprisoned him on suspicion of conspiring with Justin. He died of ill-treatment at the prison in Ravenna, NE Italy, on 18th May 526.

'Book of Revelation' or 'Book of the Apocalypse'?

Over the Sundays of the Easter Season in Year C our second readings, including today's, are taken from the last book of the Bible, alternatively titled the *Book of Revelation* or the *Book of the Apocalypse*.

These words actually mean the same thing – 'apocalypse' is from the original Greek in which the book was written (like all of the New Testament); 'revelation' is the English translation of this.

That title is taken from the book's opening words: 'Apokalypsis Iēsou Christou...' [Ἀποκάλυψις Ἰησοῦ Χριστοῦ] 'The revelation of Jesus Christ...' The words 're - veal' and 're - velation' break down literally to *removing the veil, unveiling*; and the Greek word has the same structure: *apo - kalypsis* is from *apo*, meaning 'away from', and *kalypto*, meaning 'to cover'. The cover, the veil, is taken away, and the truth of things that have been hidden is shown to us.

In connection with this, it is helpful to be aware of two related points. First, in Catholic teaching, this word 'revelation' is frequently used to mean, not just this last book in the Scriptures, but the whole action and process in which God makes himself and his will known to us – above all in Christ himself, and given to us in *all* the

books of Scripture and in the Apostolic Tradition handed down in the Church.

And second, because the things unveiled in the symbolism of the *Book of the Apocalypse* concern, among other things, the end of the world and the catastrophic events leading up to that, the word 'apocalypse' has popularly come to denote a world-ending catastrophe. However, this is not the direct meaning of the original Greek.

The *Apocalypse* tells of the mysterious vision of John (traditionally understood to be St John, author of the fourth Gospel, though the *Apocalypse* itself does not say this, and it is debated by modern scholars). The author identifies his location as the Greek island of Patmos in the eastern Aegean Sea.

Much of his vision is clearly symbolic. Part is indeed about the end of the world and 'the last things', but various scholars say it is also often speaking in a cryptic way about events in John's own time – the Roman Empire, and the persecutions the early Christians were undergoing. Others have found in it symbolic descriptions of various things that have since already happened over two thousand years of Church history.




